MISOGYNY IN EDUCATION SURVEY 2025

Alongside our Misogyny in Education Conference, the SWC Team carried out a survey to gather women's views on the topic. Respondents provided many negative experiences of their time in Scottish education, recounting stories of misogyny and violence. Social media was also discussed, with women stating that misogynistic abuse often transferred from online to physical spaces.

When asked what they believe had to be put in place to reduce misogyny in Scottish education, respondents provided multiple solutions. They proposed that misogyny should be embedded across learning and women's achievements should be celebrated. Additionally, they called for improved disciplinary procedures for those perpetuating misogyny and more women in senior leadership roles.

The Scottish Women's Convention (SWC)



We received responses from women who work across the education sector. This includes primary, secondary and further/higher education professionals.



The teaching profession is now undervalued and teachers are treated with disrespect and often targets of malice. The profession was once wonderful...now the job is a stress-inducing calamity for many.

WOMEN'S EXPERIENCES...

Over the years, I have observed a range of abusive behaviour, the incidence of this is increasing...pupils discussing sexual activity...Pupils making and sharing videos, including sexual or violent content

I have had boys shout misogynistic abuse at me when I was walking home from high school usually pretty sexually explicit comments.

My daughter...has experienced taunting, racial slurs from boys in her class, and only when my daughter reacted...the school took action

One of my high school friends would regularly get catcalled when wearing her school uniform, usually by fully grown men.

WOMEN'S SOLUTIONS...

Educate people from a young age to reject misogynistic myths and attitudes, teach children to respect one another and take swift and appropriate action where misogyny occurs

Social media and messaging platforms are regularly used as part of patterns of misogynistic bullying. Seeing 'incel' pick-up artists and similar influencers online can motivate bad behaviour

Disciplinary frameworks need to be returned to schools. The staffing and resources required to tackle this problem needs to be delivered...Educators need to be enabled to create behavioural codes of conduct
